N&W HC-46 ACF 2-Bay Covered Hopper

Division 7 offers a Norfolk & Western class HC-46 repaint scheme. The car uses the Accurail's 2200 Series ACF 2-Bay Covered Hopper as the basis. These cars are from an original batch of fifty cars built in 1966 by ACF with the Round Herald paint scheme. Some cars under went a general maintenance program and were repainted in the block N&W livery.

We found photos showing at least three of these cars (road numbers 170753, 170768, and 170794) reweighed at a later date. The area on the car is "patched out," and the new data



is displayed. Those same photos place these three cars in service in 1992 and 2004. It is these three highly unique road numbers that Cincinnati Division 7 is now offering for sale as limited edition kits.

Pricing is \$25 per car or a 3-car set at \$70. Shipping (via USPS Priority) is \$9.45 for one car and \$17.10 for two to three cars. Ohio residents, please add 7.8% sales tax on the total price of the kits and the shipping/handling fee.

T-1 Locomotive Donation By George Stringer,

T-1 Trust came together eight years back. The T-1 Trust plans to build a live Steam Engine at 1 to one scale, patterned after the PR's T-1. No T-1 survived the scrapers torch in 1953, with only a 12-year longevity.

I saw eleven of these engines as they passed my father's trucking garage between Jewett and Scio, where the Panhandle parallels the NKP. They were white-lined on their way to Dennison, Ohio, to await scrapping.

The Pennsylvania Railroad build the T-1s between 1942 and 1948. They had a non-articulated frame, two sets of drive calendars, and four-wheel pilot and trailing trucks making a 4-4-4-4 wheel arrangement. Raymond Lowey designed the T-1s. Baldwin built twenty-five T-1s, and PR's Altoona Shops built another twenty-five. The Pennsy numbered them from 5500 to 549. The recreation will carry number 5550.

Lowey designed the T-1 to pull sixteen cars at a sustained 100 MPH. They were capable of 140 MPH. At 128 feet long, one foot shorter than UP 4014, and sixteen feet high, they weighed 428 tons.

The T-1 Trust estimates the 5550 is 35% complete with a Boiler Shell, Cab Shell, Smoke Box Prowl, and six of eight Drivers cast. T-1 Trust is connecting the Boiler to the Fire Box with two 1" heated and diepressed special sheets.

T-1 Trust scanned the Frame drawings and converted them to CAD Drawings showing a length of 68 feet. A cast frame may need up to three pours to get it right at a quoted cost of three million dollars. A steel frame would need four parts joined with welds and quoted cost of one million dollars. The T-1 Trust

scheduled work on the frame for completion in 2024. Modifying the fourth driver's frame will allow the wheels to move laterally. The modification will let the engine go anywhere an SD-40 could go.

The T-1 was famous for slippage problems. The T-1 Trust proposed frame and valve gear modifications to solve slippage problems.

The T-1 Trust may complete the firebox as an oil burner instead of coal.

The drive wheels are in progress, with six of eight cast but not yet machined. The drive wheels are hollow, as were the original wheels.

A PR J-1 tender exists, as do the original pilot and trailing trucks currently under a preserved flat car. The T-1 Trust estimated the cost to duplicate a T-1 tender at three million dollars. The similar classed J-1 tender with streamlined modifications will save up to two million dollars.

The T-1 Trust has not selected an assembly site. Three sites are currently under consideration in Ohio and Pennsylvania.

The project spends donated money as received. The T-1 Trust is transparent about spending the money so donors can see where their money goes. All who work on the T-1 are volunteers. No one gets paid for their services. In 2021 a \$500 donation would get your name cast inside of one of the drivers.

The T-1 Trust bases each component contract on the amount of donated money available.
