

Retention Committee Progress Report

We held our second meeting on February 19th, and we focused on some immediate steps we could take to improve retention. One of those will be a survey asking YOU your opinion on some topics we have been discussing. Please take the time to complete the survey. I would like to thank the members of the Committee for their time and talents. The Committee members are Bob Baker, Matt Goodman, Bruce McDonald, Ken McDonough, Michael Percy, Butch Sage, and Jerry Severson.

You will notice some significant changes in upcoming meetings, and please look for monthly updates here in the Super's Signal as we continue our efforts.

Calipers

I've purchased several sets of calipers over the years, with the most recent (and highest-end) set purchased in 2016. I've used them all long enough to know their relative strengths, so I decided to share some thoughts.

The photo (Figure 1) shows the four calipers I currently own, each with a 6-inch (150 mm) range. From left to right, they are:

♦ General branded, Swiss-made calipers, synthetic. These have a resolution of 0.001 (one-thousandth) inch and weigh 1.5 ounces (43 grams). The right side of

the main scale features a secondary, metric scale with 1 mm resolution.

- ♦ These are Frankfort-branded, Chinese-made stainless steel calipers. They resolve to .001 inch and weigh 6.9 ounces (196 g). There are no secondary metric markings.
- ♦ General branded, USA-made synthetic. These measure to 0.01 inch, weigh 1.3 ounces (37 g), and feature secondary metric markings (1 mm resolution) along with a secondary scale on the dial showing fractional inches.
- ♦ Mitutoyo stainless steel calipers with a digital readout resolve to .0005 inches and .01 mm. They weigh 5.6 ounces (159 g) and measure both imperial and metric units equally well.

General Lessons

Plastic is not necessarily an indicator of "cheap." I purchased the yellow General calipers in 1978, and to this day, they are still accurate enough for 90% of the measurements I make. Even the action is decent, though minor adjustments in the thousandths are tricky due to a very slight bind in the mechanism. Some consideration has to be given for jaw flex - i.e., inconsistent use of the thumbwheel can lead to inconsistent

measurements.

- Chinese-made is not solely an indicator of being "cheap." I purchased the Franklins in the mid-'90s, and they became the go-to tool for light machining The action is very smooth, and the tasks. measurements are reliable and repeatable.
- Digital is not superior to dial. The Franklin dial and Mitutoyo digital gauges are very consistent between one and four inches. I personally prefer the dial for its mechanical precision and fine watch aspect, plus it doesn't require batteries. Digital has the advantage of being entirely agnostic about units of measurement you can easily switch from decimal inches to metric. Choose your preference.

Pick your poison

- · Alas, not all devices are created equal. A cheap digital set I picked up at a "tool man" display was so bad that I set it down somewhere. I don't know where it is, and I don't care if I ever find it again. It had inconsistent and terrible action.
- A note on batteries: Inexpensive digital calipers can go through multiple batteries each year unless you remove the battery between uses. My Mitutoyo caliper is still on its original battery - eight years and counting counting.

More Lessons

- Plastic is better than metal for some applications. Weight and relative softness are the key factors here. I find it much easier to use the vellow Generals for model building; they balance better, and there's no risk of scratching a finish or crushing a delicate model if it slips from your grasp. (I'm looking at you, Tichy).
- Metal is superior to plastic for certain applications. If you need to draw a line or require measurement consistency, you will find it here.
- More resolution is not necessarily better than less. For 90% of what I measure, I need accuracy to 0.01 inches. For another 5%, I require 0.1 inches. For the rest, I may want 0.001 inches. When sorting brass wire, they all work just fine.
- A longer caliper is not inherently superior to a shorter one. Most calipers available on the mainstream market today have a 6-inch or 150 mm measuring range. I can count on two hands the number of times I've used anything beyond four inches. calipers tend to be lighter and are less likely to

- obstruct your movement or get caught on a shirt sleeve while working at the bench. However, shorter options are less common and sometimes more expensive.
- A "Brand Name" is not necessarily better than unbranded options. My private-label branded dial calipers are of very high quality; see the point on digital vs. dial above. However, if you are shopping for unbranded calipers, I'd advise buying from a source known for offering high-quality unbranded tools (see the last paragraph). When buying from an unfamiliar source, such as eBay or Amazon, selecting items by brand serves as a reliable indicator of quality.
- You get what you pay for. This is generally true at the high-precision end, but it's up to the end user to determine the necessary level of precision.

Here are backlit photos of the closed jaws of my four calipers, which indicate their manufacturing quality. I have also included specific comments for each one.

Yellow General (Switzerland). The jaw fit is not perfect, but it is very serviceable. I've had these since 1978, forty-six years! They are by far my most-used set. Some of that imperfect jaw fit may be due to wear. They were purchased for a different hobby, but now they are used much more for modeling. They are also my go-to tool when measuring depth in narrow spaces (i.e., a small hole) since the depth gauge is a round rod only 0.05 inches in diameter.




Figure 2 (Photo by Matt Goodman)

Orange General (USA). These calipers have a significant gap at the tip of the jaws, and their action is mediocre at best, but they are still serviceable depending on what you want to use them for. The dial has graduations for fractional inches and decimals, so they can be

handy for sorting drill bits that have gotten mixed. I bought these on a Continued on Page 7



whim when I spotted them on sale at a big box store almost completely due to my experience with the yellow General.

Franklin (China). These calipers are really nice, but there's a bit of light between the tip and base of the jaw. There's also a tiny sliver of light at the tip that's hard to see in this photo. These saw more action after my wife got me a mini-mill about eighteen years ago, but I've had them for way longer than that. They're better suited for measuring metal than plastic and have a very smooth action. For model work, they're too heavy and unbalanced.

Mitutoyo (Japan). These have a dead-perfect inside and outside jaw fit. The action is smoother than the



Franklin, though it has a different feel since there is no gear mechanism associated with the movement. They turned out to be more usable for modeling than expected as they are significantly lighter at 1.3 oz or 37 g less and better balanced than the Franklins.

Regarding places to source calipers and many other tools useful in the hobby, in the past couple of years, I have been going to McMaster-Carr for both high-quality and cost tools and especially for less expensive equivalents. McMaster-Carr often lists their products as "Premium" vs. "High Grade" or sometimes, Economy, where Premium is a brand name vs. unbranded. Inexpensive tools don't have to be bad, and I've come to trust McMaster-Carr's buyers' choices. The inexpensive tools I've purchased from them have been of high quality. If I know my product, I may shop around. If I don't, I'll buy from McMaster-Carr.

A set of calipers is indispensable for this hobby. Consider adding them to your toolbox if you haven't already done so.



All Aboard Ohio

At the February All Aboard Ohio (AAO) meeting we received some positive news about Ohio passenger rail.

Mitch reported that the Ohio Chamber of Commerce spoke publicly in favor of passenger rail at the Ohio House Transportation Committee meeting. To the best of our knowledge, this marks the first time in the AAO's 50+ year history that the Chamber has expressed support for rail development. Having Ohio's most significant business advocacy group align with our efforts is a major milestone—it signals that passenger rail is a mainstream economic priority.

The Vice Chair of the Ohio House Transportation Committee, Jack Daniels (R-New Franklin), shared a shift in perspectant AAO Continued on Page 8

tive. He openly stated that he would have opposed expanding passenger rail in Ohio ten years ago. However, after witnessing the changes in the world—especially post-COVID—he now believes that rail is the right step forward. Hearing a leader publicly acknowledge how and why his views have evolved gave me a renewed sense of optimism.

John reiterated the Ohio Chamber of Commerce's support for passenger rail. Step 2 of the state-sponsored Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) Corridor ID Projects will be funded by the Ohio Rail Development Commission (ORDC) General Fund. This funding is intended for further study of the 3C&D corridor. Funding for membership in the Midwest Interstate Passenger Rail Commission (MIPRC) will be provided by the state.

(Note: *The Columbus Dispatch* reported that Ohio will fund the membership in the MIPRC.) The MIPRC is a multi-state compact vital for coordinating and advocating for regional passenger rail improvements.

Stu reported that advocacy for passenger rail development is divided into two parts. All Aboard Ohio will focus on passenger rail within the state, while the Rail

Passenger Association (RPA) will concentrate on issues related to passenger rail at the national level. He shared success stories from states like Virginia, North Carolina, Michigan, and Illinois, along with positive ridership trends on Amtrak routes such as the Borealis and the Downeaster. Despite uncertainty about the federal budget, considerable positive momentum is building across the country in support of passenger rail.
